The Chair asked all to stand for a Moment of Silence.

The City Clerk announces that the requirement of N.J. S.A. 10:4-9 et. Seq., "Sunshine Law" has been met.

A notice of this meeting was sent to the Orange Transcript-Record and printed on Friday, May 24, 2019 and also to the Star Ledger printed on Tuesday, May 29, 2019 posted on the Bulletin Board in City Hall and filed in and filed in the Office of the City Clerk.

MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION

Calendar Year Budget 2019 - Budget Hearing (2)

- Library, Community Services, Public Works/Planning

Library started their presentation at 7:15 p.m.

- Library- Director Wiggins made her opening statement
- Mr. McKnight the Library Board Chair accompanied Ms. Wiggins to the podium.
- Director Wiggins provided the Council with a summary of her background and goals for the Orange Library. She commented that she is part time until this December.
- She sees new technology for the library and teaching residents about the internet.
- Digital books to borrow from windows or MAC computers.
- Security Cameras added to the library
- Reported on the international Food Fest, Yoga/Meditation classes, a Spring Literary Feast and after school tutoring.
- Reported that the unemployment amount includes the past due amounts.
- BA Hartwyk spoke about the pension contracts for the library.

- The library cannot apply for grants due to the audits that need to be completed.
- The BA reported that the city would pay for the audits for the library.
- Ms. Wiggins spoke about new software for the library.
- With regard to capital improvements, she would like a new roof, window replacements and the building to be painted.

The City Council reviewed the library's budget and the CBAC representative asked why the library is separate from the city. The Business Administrator reported that the separation is so the library is not involved in city politics. Ms. Wigfall asked Ms. Wiggins her vision of the library is. Ms. Wiggins replied that she would like air conditioning, new chairs, she would like to do book sales to remove out of date books. She was asked why the library needs legal services. The Business Administrator reported that there are ongoing collective bargaining negotiations. The presentation finished at 8:12 p.m. See Exhibit A and B.

Community Services started their presentation at 8:20 pm

Director Sykes and Mr. Pressey came to the podium. Director Sykes made an opening statement.

Director Sykes presented a power point presentation. (Exhibit C) Ms. Sykes also spoke about the achievements of the Department.

- Implementation of a Strategic Task Force
- Organizational restructuring to streamline services
- New adult health clinic
- Community Health Fair
- Senior vaccine program with the Orange Health Department
- Pet health outreach initiative in collaboration with Animal Control and the Associated Humane Society.
- Flu and pneumonia clinics for children and seniors.

The Council reviewed their budget plan and asked questions. Councilwoman Williams asked about the figure for the nurses. Ms. Sykes reported that one nurse was being paid by grant money. Councilwoman Williams spoke about Comcast only broadcasting one channel not two. The CBAC representative Mr. Allen and Ms. Sykes discussed salaries between 2018 and 2019 and the redistribution of that money. The presentation concluded at 9:20 p.m.

Public Works and Planning Departments started their presentation at 9:25 pm

Director Mayes and Deputy Director Wingfield came to the podium.

Director Mayes made an opening statement and he and Deputy Director Wingfield provided information on:

- Colgate Skate Park Phase I was completed and included items that the residents requested. Phase II will start around 60 days from June. Councilwoman Williams asked about paving. Director Mayes stated that no city parking lots would be paved in 2019.
- The Central Park Field House had been paved and the building will be shipped in.
- The Highland Avenue Train Station will be able to go out to bid soon.
- 2019 Road way improvements some city roads will be paved this year.

- Brook Alley Parking lot improvements and the vehicle wash station have new roof and security.
- Signs have been ordered that will replace older signs.

Director Mayes spoke about some department highlights in Planning and DPW.

- The NJIB Roadway Pavement Project (Exhibit D)
- The Traffic signal inventory
- Snow removal equipment has been improved
- Public Works garage
- Brine solution
- Wright Express/gasoline
- Installation of gas/ diesel above ground tanks
- The increased use of parks and repairs.

Director Mayes reported on the goals for DPW:

- The renovation on Colgate Pool.
- Upgrade Central Playground play equipment.
- College Park memorial

Council Members reviewed the DPW and Planning department's budgets. Councilman Johnson reported he would like an update on the Train station. Councilwoman Williams commented that truck route signs are needed. Business Administrator Hartwyk reported that that road belongs to the Department of Transportation and he will speak with them. Councilwoman Eason commented that store employees are parking in front of stores and shoppers have nowhere to park. The Deputy Director commented that the parks are not being cleaned after events by the residents so DPW cleans park and are paid overtime. The CBAC had no questions.

The BA made an opening statement for the Planning Department. The Council reviewed their budget. The CBAC did not have any questions for Planning.

Motion to adjourn by Councilman Jackson seconded by Councilman Johnson, Jr. The motion was unanimously approved at 10:34 p.m.

LIBRARY CARD

LIBRARY RECORDS

REQUESTS FOR MATERIAL

Get A Library Card

Residents of the City of Orange Township can get a free library card by coming to the library and completing a registration form. An adult, 18 and over, must be present and show a valid, state-issued photo identification card with current address. If the ID does not have a current address, an utility bill, or other official piece of mail is required. Library cards are valid for one (1) year and may be renewed with the same type of identification upon expiration.

For minors, a responsible adult must accompany and sign for minors 17 years and under, with the same proof of address mentioned above. Parents or guardians are responsible for the library activities of their minor children.

Cardholders are responsible for any late fees and for any lost or damaged items borrowed on their card. In addition, cardholders agree to abide by OPL policies. No material may be checked out using another person's library card.

Address and Name Changes

Please report name, phone, e-mail and address changes to the Circulation Desk as soon as possible.

Lost Library Cards

Cardholders are responsible for securing their cards. All use of the card is the cardholders responsibility. Lost and stolen cards should be reported immediately. There is a \$2.00 fee to replace a lost card.

REBL

Essex County residents with a REBL sticker on their library cards can visit and borrow from other libraries throughout the county that participate in the REBL program.

Confidentiality of Library Records

The Library complies with all local, state, and federal confidentiality laws.

BORROWING MATERIAL

Loan Period & Renewal

Due dates are printed on receipt slips when an item is checked out. An item may be renewed unless it is reserved for another library patron. If an item is overdue or your library card is expired, you cannot renew online, you must come in to renew your card. Our loan and renewal periods are:

*Adult, YA & Children's books: 21 days
New books: 21 days
Audiobooks & CDs: 21 days
DVDs: 7 days*

Telephone Renewals

Library patrons may call the library's Circulation Desk for renewals. Books, audiobooks and CDs can be renewed once over the phone. DVDs must be returned and checkout again.

Returning Library Material

Library patrons may return library books, DVDs, CDs when the library is closed by placing them in one of the book drops to the right of the front door.

REQUESTS FOR MATERIAL

Interlibrary Loan (ILL)

When the OPL does not own an item, Librarians can request the item from other libraries. This material is sent to the Orange Public Library for use. Interlibrary loan requests are limited to four requests at a time. There is no charge for this service unless the lending Library charges a fee for photocopies. Patrons will be informed of fees prior to accepting the request. ILL items are not renewable, therefore, borrowed material must be returned on or before the due date.

Late or Lost Interlibrary Loan (ILL)

If a patron loses or does not return ILL items, they will be billed for the replacement of the material plus any processing fees charged by the lending Library. Failure to return items will result in suspension of borrowing privileges until the items are paid for or returned.

BORROWING POLICIES

Late Fees

Late fees are charged for each item returned after the due date. Fees are as follows:
*Adult/ YA/ Children's books: 10 per day
Audiobooks and CDs: 10 per day
DVDs: 2.00 per day
ILL: .25 per day (books); 2.00 per day (DVDs)*

Overdue Accounts

Once a patron owes \$5 or more, the system will automatically block their ability to checkout and renew. This includes ILL items.

Damaged, Missing, or Lost Items

A patron returning a damaged item, will be charged for the item. Missing or lost items will incur a charge of the cost of the item.

Patron Notification Services

Two past due courtesy notices followed by a bill will be mailed to the address in the patron's record when material is not returned.

Holds/Reserves

Holds may be placed, by library staff, on any material available or currently checked out. Patrons will be notified by telephone when the item becomes available. The item must be picked up at the Circulation Desk within three (3) days of notification.

WEBSITE SERVICES

Website Address

The Orange Public Library (OPL) website is <http://www.orangepl.org/>. The online catalog and online databases are available 24/7.

LIBRARY COMPUTER SERVICES

Who Can Use

Internet computers are available on a first come, first served basis. Generally, there is a one-hour limit per day per cardholder.

Wireless Services

The Orange Public Library provides free Wi-Fi to patrons with wireless enabled devices. Ask the Library staff for assistance with logging on.

Printing

Black and white printing is available from the internet computers. The \$.20 per page fee is collected at the Circulation Desk. A public copier is also available for \$.20 per page. Patrons must pay for all pages that are included in the job they send to the printer.

Notary and Fax Services

The Library does provide Notary Services for \$2.50 for the first page and \$.75 for each additional page .

EXHIBIT B

PARKING

Metered Parking

The City of Orange Township provides metered parking in the front and on the side of the Library building. Patrons are responsible for abiding by all parking ordinances.

USER RESPONSIBILITIES

User Responsibilities

The Library prohibits any use of library computers for illegal activities, or to access material that is obscene, contains or makes reference to explicit sexual material defined by New Jersey Law, contains child pornography, or is harmful to minors. Users should not access sites that are inappropriate for viewing in public and are responsible for complying with copyright law, licensing agreements, and for paying fee-based service charges.

We enhance the quality of life by promoting good physical and mental health, preventing illness and injury, protecting the environment, and providing recreational services to residents of all ages.



- Continuing to streamline the flyer and social media request process, which reduced confusion and untimely production. **Outcome:** Less flyer misinformation & earlier distribution.
- Continuing to update and tweak the system for a single access city event calendar. **Outcome:** Reduced same day multiple/overlapping events; Increases community participation; possibly increase dignitary participation.

Communication/Advertisement Initiatives (Con't)

External:

1. Continuing the communications coalition consisting of Orange stakeholders, such as churches, nonprofits, health organizations, tenant associations, etc. Each entity has its own populations of clients, participants, consumers & congregations.

Purpose: (1) To be informed of each others services (2) To access each others population of participants (3) To inform and engage a higher number of Orange residents.
