Questions

1. History of organization:

The City of Orange Township in Essex County New Jersey is a 2.2 square mile urban community of about 30,000 residents, located directly outside of the City of Newark, the largest city in New Jersey, and is only about 13 miles east of NYC. This portion of Essex County is extremely built-up and densely populated, and often suffers from the same urban ills of larger cities — environmental threats, limited resources, and notable economic inequality — which has ultimately led to widespread divestment and economic blight throughout Orange. This post-industrial community is a prime example of a community struggling with the effects of poverty and an ever-shrinking municipal budget. Despite these challenges, the City of Orange Township is proud to be of serving one of the most culturally diverse, artistically vibrant, and upward bound municipalities in the State of New Jersey. Our constituency is often characterized as decidedly low income and comprised of racial and ethnic minorities; in fact, the racial



breakdown is: 69.9% Black, 21.7% Latino/Hispanic, 4.5% White, 1.5% Asian and 2.4% other/mixed raced. Furthermore, 24% of the overall community and 38.3% of children fall below poverty line.

Since its inception, the Orange Department of Recreation, operating under the umbrella of the Department of Community Services, has been devoted to one goal: promoting the well-being of children, young adults and the senior community. These works are critical to the inner city, which struggles with the effects of generational poverty, obesity, and criminal activity (often related to violent crime, drug and gang activity). To battle against these challenges, the Rec. Department has played an enduring and vital role of developing and administering programs to enhance the quality of life by promoting good physical and mental health, preventing illness and injury, protecting the environment, and providing recreational services to residents of all ages. Our youth programs are designed to physically and mentally engage the with children, helping them to develop into well rounded and upstanding citizens. This approach helps the city to build stronger families, promote mental and physical health, education, and serves to strengthen the community as a whole.

The Department of Recreation is one of the most active and in-touch departments in the City of Orange Township, and has been successful bridge between the Township administration to the community members. Thus far, the Recreation Department has been able to continuously maintain vibrant sports programming for baseball, soccer, tennis, track, and football throughout the year and enjoys significant community interest and participation. However, the Recreation Department has recognized that the sport of lacrosse is growing nationwide, and would like to introduce lacrosse programming to our residents, as well. Orange has come to realize that children from economically distressed and urban communities like Orange often find themselves drawn to two major sports: basketball and football. This is often because a false narrative is propagated in the inner city, that: football and basketball present clear and multitudinous opportunities for college scholarships, which could potentially lead to wealth in the future. While football and basketball are incredibly worthwhile activities, it is clear that very few individuals will be granted college scholarships, and even fewer will



play either sport professionally. This is specifically why the Township is making its best effort introduce lacrosse to Orange, and to produce first-class programming in all of the sporting activities that will provide diversified recreational and educational experiences and opportunities for our youth.

2. How does your organization benefit the community? Please include any charity work or activities your organization has participated in or hosted.

The Department of Recreation is itself intended to be of service to the community by providing varied opportunities for recreational programming that is affordable to our more than 30,000 residents. In the same vein, the department is tasked with the oversight and operation of a number of Orange Township programs, including: a recreation football program, youth baseball program, youth soccer program, youth tennis program, and youth basketball program; as well as a cheerleading program and a variety of special events operated throughout the year. In addition, the Recreation Department also oversees and runs programming for senior citizens and residents with disabilities.

The Township's demographic data sheds a clearer light on the communities need and dependence on the Recreation Department's high quality and affordable sports programming. Orange's mean family income is \$59,137, less than half of the State of New Jersey mean of \$123,936. Further, the per capita income in the area is \$21,743, just over half of the New Jersey benchmark of \$39,069. Moreover, 22.3% of Orange households rely on SNAP benefits (food stamps) for food assistance versus 9.2% statewide, and as astounding 24% of its individuals live below the poverty line versus 10.7% statewide. These statistics demonstrate the economic reality for Orange's residents, highlighting the need for sustained and expanded recreational offerings. Yet, over the last five years, the City of Orange Township has seen departmental operating budgets cut by as much as 20% across the board. The impact of which has reverberated throughout the department, resulting in incredibly few expenditures. The fact that we are still able to maintain such diverse and successful programs is a testament to the Recreation Department's ability to budget both sparingly and creatively to ensure that we are able to accommodate



as many interested participants as possible. For each sport on Orange's recreational calendar, we aim to keep registration fees low so that they are not burdensome to parents. Each season has a starting fee of \$25 dollars which is hopefully manageable for most parents financially. If not, the township attempts to offer hardship waivers to those youth so that they too can enjoy the game. The township takes on the burden of providing the equipment and supplies using the registration fees and the municipal allotment for each sport offered within the system.

We have witnessed the numerous benefits of our existing sports programming, but hope that the introduction of lacrosse will help to teach our youth essential life skills, including but not limited to: teamwork, leadership, the importance of physical and mental exercise, reliability, and self-confidence.

As long as our players are developing some of these principles, the Department of Recreation values its efforts as successful and worth investing the time and resources into pursuing.

Essay

Describe how a grant would help this school or community take programming to the next level; include three specific goals.

The City of Orange Township proposes utilizing Bill Belichick Foundation grant funds to implement the Township's first youth lacrosse program, to be overseen by the City of Orange Township Recreation Department. This would be the culmination of an idea that developed from a brief lacrosse introduction clinic that was given to children in Orange for one week in the summer of 2016. The success of that program inspired the City to beginning planning to hold a full lacrosse program in town by making connections to experienced players and advisors on the sport on how to establish a successful program. Unfortunately, the startup costs for a lacrosse program requires more than the City could allot so the idea is begin held off for the time being.

An investment from the Bill Belichick Foundation would give our program just the kickstart we need to begin identifying potential participants; cultivating additional financing (through further grant



proposals and community fundraising); recruiting parents and volunteers to assist with the administration and maintenance of the team, and recruiting and training coaches/officials. As previously stated, the Recreation Department's funding is far too limited to implement a new program on its own, but a grant award would allow for the development and provision of a program that is committed to instilling, growing, and nurturing the love of lacrosse, while also promoting good sportsmanship, loyalty and mutual respect.

If awarded funding through this proposal, Bill Belichick funds would be reserved for the purchase of equipment needed to play the game, once we've recruited and developed our team. This will include the following equipment for each player: complete stick, mouth guard, National Operating Committee on Standards for Athletic Equipment (NOCSAE) approved helmet, arm pads/arm guards, shoulder pads, field player gloves, and rib pads — which are recommended for youth. We will also purchase equipment to outfit youth playing the position of goalie, including: complete stick, chest protector, goalie gloves, throat guards, pelvic protection/goalie pants, arm pads/arm guards, and shoulder pads. We anticipate that the average cost to fully outfit each player with the aforementioned equipment is approximately \$600. The remaining funding will be applied to the cost of uniforms.

Bill Belichick funding would help the City of Orange Township accomplish the following program goals:

- Introduce the goal of lacrosse to the City of Orange Township, by registering and scheduling program activities in fall/spring of the upcoming year.
- 2. Purchasing equipment to outfit Orange's inaugural lacrosse team
- 3. Work with trained coaches so that lacrosse can become a staple in the community
- Develop a strong program that will allow the youth lacrosse team to begin serving as a feeder program for high school teams and ultimately help players get to college.

The program would be implemented with the following milestones in mind:



- Organize a summer program during the summer months to get a feel for the level of interest from the community at the current date.
- Speak to and coordinate with contacts at local universities including Monmouth, Rutgers, and
 Princeton to get established players to volunteer coach over the summer.
- 3. Start a spring program with two levels: 3rd/4th grade combined and 5th/6th grade combined.
- 4. Hire 2 coaches per group for Spring 2020.
- 5. Reach out to community organizations to help with fundraising. Groups may include but are not limited to: Police Athletic League, lacrosse teams from local universities, Major League Lacrosse, local bars and restaurants, and can shakes (youth fundraising).

If awarded the funding from the Bill Belichick Foundation would be used for specific expenses including purchasing equipment and uniforms for participants. The Recreation Department also anticipates hiring lacrosse coaches because there are no coaches within the City that are experienced in lacrosse. We estimate that the coaches will cost \$25-\$50 dollar per hour during the approximately 8-week season. Though the city will seek additional grant funding to assist with the cost of the professional development for coaches, it is likely that funds will come from the Recreation Department's operating budget. Once the startup expenses have been made the City of Orange Township expects the lacrosse program to be self-sufficient using registration fees. Fees and fundraising activities will help to cover costs associated with transportation, uniforms, balls, pinnies, and other incidentals.

The City of Orange respectfully requests \$10,000 from the Bill Belichick Foundation to accomplish the goals and milestones set above. Thank you for your time and consideration.
