I would like to submit a question regarding "Resolution 479-2021 Central Valley Redevelopment Continuation": What has precipitated this resolution and the possible review of this redevelopment plan by the planning board? What do the council and business administrator think the advantages or disadvantages are for a continuation of this plan as it stands (as an Area in Need of Redevelopment with Condemnation Plan)? Thank you for your consideration.

Is the city currently involved in any lawsuit concerning any of the Area in Need of Redevelopment **with Condemnation** Plans? If so, which areas? Are these lawsuits ongoing?

My name is Daniel Joseph Wiley, Managing Director of The HUUB, located at 35-47 Cleveland Street. As an organization, property owner, and social justice advocate in the City, we would like to submit the following questions & suggestions for the Council:

- 1) With residents recovering from the economic impacts of Covid-19, and many still facing threats of eviction, foreclosure, insurmountable debt, and either new or growing housing insecurities, what is the City of Orange planning to ensure that residents are protected once moratoriums and other protections are lifted by the State in 2022?
- 2) As new developments with density come into the city (one of them proposed for Cleveland St.), when will we see policy for renters that:
- Creates affordable options for renters in new developments
- Protects renters from unlawful evictions
- Does not create clusters or pockets of both wealthy and indigent housing
- Ensures affordable quality housing for renting families
- 3) As homeowners face some of the hardest decisions to make because of foreclosure threats and growing utility debts, how will the City be looking to protect homeowners?

When the time is right, and we believe that time is now, the following suggestions would like to be discussed:

1) Inclusionary Zoning Ordinance that creates opportunities for families and individuals seeking new affordable housing options that are attached to new housing developments that are built with density, and are granted special permission(s) from the planning/zoning boards.

- 2) A stronger rent control ordinance that does not grant rent increases without substantial capital improvements to units or common spaces, and also does reward landlords with profits when there are *any* code violations at the property.
- 3) A Right to Counsel Program that gives free access to legal counsel for tenants facing eviction in landlord and tenant court.
- 4) The HUUB would like to be involved in any discussions about policy that protects the most vulnerable residents, but also creates new opportunities for the entire City of Orange. The last 20 months have been a collective suffering, and the pandemic continues to create unfortunate circumstances in our state, and our black and brown communities are, unfortunately, still the last to find help in the right direction. Now is the time to plan for a future in Orange that is based on recovery and revitalization, and must include <u>all</u> residents in the process.

- 1. Why the delay in holding a mandatory noticed CY 2021 Best Practices Inventory Response Public Hearing pursuant to Local Finance Notice 2021-17 (Sept. 29, 2021)?
- 2. What is the status of CY 2021 Best Practices Inventory Response?
- 3. What is the status of the CY 2020 Audit?
- 4. What is the status of monthly and quarterly operating and revenue reports prepared under the direction of Orange's Finance Director?
- 5. What legislative oversight steps has the local governing body taken to combat the low hanging fruit public corruption allegations contained in Ted Sherman's Oct. 31, 2021 Sunday Star Ledger Front Page Article?
- 6. With the publication of Ted Sherman's front page blistering public corruption expose of Orange, will the local governing body authorize the retention of independent special outside counsel with redevelopment/long term tax exemption/low income housing tax credit law expertise and competence to investigate the public corruption allegations contained in all my Feld related complaints, including pending Remanded Feld X, Feld XIX and Feld XX?
- 7. Or, will the local governing body continue to act as ostriches burying their heads in the sand while exposing their backsides to their enemies?
- 8. Who was Orange's Qualified Purchasing Agent when these low-hanging fruit public corruption allegations occurred?
- 9. Before Orange's new BA arrived in August 2016 shortly after the July 2016 federal raid of the Orange public library, who had access to Mr. Mapp's signature stamp?
- 10. After our BA's arrival in August 2016, what payment approval reforms did he institute?
- 11. Does the local governing body have the authority to remove any Director after providing appropriate due process notice and an opportunity to be heard?
