The City Clerk announced that Richard Noizy volunteered services on February 6th, 19th & 27th 2022 and January 8th, 16th & 23rd 2022

OPRA REPORTS:

The City Clerk announced that for the month of February 2022 there were 55 OPRA requests received, 28 completed and 27 remaining.

COUNCIL REPORTS

The Council President directed the City Clerk to file reports.

Police Chief, Vincent Vitiello informed everyone that the Township of Orange crime is steady as opposed to surrounding towns. There will be a collaboration with the Fire Department, the NROTC Ceremony on Friday, March 18, 2022 at The Orange Preparatory Academy from 10:45am – 12:00 noon and it would be nice for councilmembers to show up. Councilmember Harold J. Johnson, Jr stated that he is pleased about the new technology and how it helps with gang violence. Chief Vincent Vitiello stated gang on gang crime is the reason for the increase in crime and why there are collaborations with other towns. Councilmember Weldon Montague, III will speak off line with Chief Vincent Vitiello about the program the Director of Re-Entry has in place as the Councilmember is a Certified Specialist and will lend a hand. Councilmember Jamie Summers Johnson was pleased with the list of Officers being promoted to Sergeant and the fact that they will soon start recruitment as it is an inspiration for the young people of the city. Council Vice President Tency A. Eason inquired about the Junior Police Academy which is coming soon. Director Sykes interjected it should begin in July and a flier will be pushed out. There was a grant that will help with the costs. Councilmember Clifford R. Ross asked to expand on the amount of participants which is usually 25. It is similar to boot camp and the recruits learn character and discipline and the students have a sense of accomplishment. Chief Derrick Brown is looking forward to the academy as the fire and police departments will collaborate. Councilmember Clifford R. Ross inquired about the costs which there are none due to the \$16,000 grant. Council President Kerry J. Coley inquired how many of the inmates were released to Orange, which Chief Vincent Vitiello replied there were none.

Fire Director, Derrick Brown stated he was excited about the new firefighters and how they are moving the city forward to make positive changes in the City of Orange. He is excited to move from the garage to the desk, and he looks forward to making a difference. Councilmember Weldon Montague, III offered congratulations to him on his new position and offered his assistance from himself and Councilmember Jamie Summers Johnson who is also a Liaison. Council Vice President Tency A. Eason also offered congratulations and was happy about the collaborations with the Police Dept. Councilmember Harold J. Johnson, Jr. apologized for not attending his swearing in but offered congratulations at this time. There will be a formal searing-in at a later date. Councilmember Clifford R. Ross also gave congratulatory remarks. Director Wendy Sykes asked the Fire Chief to speak about the program collaboration with the Community Services Department. There will be an Easter Brunch for seniors, the date TBA. Seniors will be bused in and Chief Derrick Brown will be in the kitchen cooking.

Public Works, Marty Mayes stated there will be a shredding event on Saturday April 23rd from 9am – 12noon in the City Hall parking lot. He stated if there is another snow storm in the forecast we are prepared. There is some planting in the works and there is a new watering truck. Marty Mayes also stated that there are grants as previously stated to revitalize the parks. Council Vice President Tency A. Eason inquired about the spikes for Main Street which arrived and will be installed soon in a different configuration. College Park has reopened, and residents were out enjoying the good weather. The lights on Main Street need to synchronize with the County lights. For Earth Day there will be a City-Wide Clean-up. Councilmember Weldon Montague, III requested that 307 Day Street graffiti be removed, and when will the drain be repaired. Director Marty Mayes stated the repairs will begin when the weather breaks. The Duane Street resident is still having concerns of feeling safe in her backyard planting and needs bollards at the slow curve and yellow painting to prevent parking in the narrow area. Council President Kerry J. Coley inquired about an accident on Main and Oakwood that needs cleanup.

Planning Department, Chris Mobley stated there was a Tri-Community Commercial and Residential Seminar (East Orange, Irvington & Orange) held on Thursday March 10th led by Mayor Dwayne Warren and Planning Director Laquanna Best. There were six redevelopment projects that were discussed during the seminar: 205 Mt Vernon, the Wawa at 164 Main Street, development at 377 Crane Street, 258 Reock Street, 49 South Day and 394 Highland Avenue. The boards of each project were presented with the information about number of units and parking. They presented on a number of programs that the department felt would be of interest to the residents: the African American Chamber of Commerce - How to grow small business, NJ Redevelopment Authority – Support and Training for Developers of Color. Orange will receive \$640,000 this fiscal year that ends June 30th and Chris Mobley gave suggestions as to which programs should receive the funds. Public Safety, Street Scape, Façade, Loan and or Teen Clean Program were the list of possible programs he will provide information and present to the administration for consideration.

Tax Collector, Paula Fierra had news from the Governor's Office, a proposal to change the homestead rebate from a tax bill credit back to individual checks, to each eligible tax payer. The Governor is proposing a four year program that would increase the rebates from \$750 to \$1125 per year after four years, additionally there will be a rebate to renters for \$225. Councilmember Clifford R. Ross asked when this would take effect. It is just a proposal as of now.

Tax Assessor, Chris Murray stated that the Reevaluation has concluded and as of March 10th the Essex County Board certified the list. Residents can reach out to him if they feel their assessment is not fair and residents need to act before July 1st.

Chief Financial Officer, Nile Clements apologized for the walk on concerning the Comcast Bill as there is a deadline fast approaching.

Director Community Services, Wendy Sykes stated there is a Women's Day Celebration on March 26th at Appian Way. Councilmember Weldon Montague, III inquired how the after school programs will impact spring outdoor sports. The Spring Sports should end by May. Keith Pressy anticipates spring programs to begin in April and end in June which is when summer programs will begin. There is a robust menu for all ages so Councilmembers should encourage residents to register. They are looking for lifeguards as there are more openings. Councilmember Jamie Summers Johnson was thankful for the work that Keith Pressy does. Keith will establish a pop-up location at each school to encourage registration. Director Wendy Sykes will also be conduct registration for Mayor Warrens Camp.

The current zoning needs parking solutions. James Ward stated the he may come with complaints, but he also come with solutions to the complaints.

Quantavia Hilbert of 353 Lincoln Ave – Ms. Hilbert referred to the programs previously mentioned She heard Planning Board, Chris Mobley speak about public safety and loan programs as she would like to know the timeline and is there further information. Business Administrator Chris Hartwyk informed her the program is still in the development stage and at an appropriate time it will be presented. She wanted to thank Police Chief Vincent Vitiello as there has been an increase in help with public safety and support. The signs and markings on the road at Scotland Rd still need attention. How can we get curb paintings on Scotland Rd so there is more visibility? Also a sign and speed bump on Lincoln Place.

Councilmember Clifford R. Ross inquired about the parking meters on Main Street as he has counted 135 meters of which 5 meters are not functioning and that is a loss of revenue. He would like an accounting for the revenue each month. Business Administrator Chris Hartwyk stated some meters are in need new parts which the contract resolution to order those parts will be presented at the April meeting

Councilmember Jamie Summers-Johnson spoke about the event with the South Ward Renters Association where The Essex County Legal Aide Association presented. Planning ahead there will be an Easter Egg Hunt which is a collaboration with South Ward District Leader, Stacey Martin, Jeff Wingfield and David Armstrong. There will be reminders will go home through the school and signs at Metcalf Park.

Councilman Harold Johnson, Jr., spoke about the work in the West Ward with a new home coming for sale and DPW department came to their assistance. There is an old lingering problem along South Center Street that Marty Mayes made sure was taken care of. Councilmember Johnson, Jr. hopes to get a better rate of response to hotline calls between Central and Ivy Court. Let's reflect on the food insecurities. Keep our neighbors in pray.

Council Vice-President Tency A. Eason wanted to do a follow up on the cleanup of 770 N. Jefferson which has a work order and asked if 454 Orange Rd. could be addressed tomorrow. She gave thanks to the various departments for their work.

Council President Kerry Coley stated the East Orange | Orange Community Development Corporation on Evergreen Place (973-266-5315) will provide turkeys to residents of Orange for Easer. Council President Coley asked the Business Administrator about the lease agreement with the County and if we have begun talks about renegotiating the terms. He will talk further with the Business Administrator offline. The Council President gave thanks to St James Church for providing free meals to residents. There was a conversation with the Chief Financial Officer, Nile Clements about the lack of service with the email system. Council President Coley would like to look into using the service Constant Contact which should be billed directly to the city and paid by the city.




